

Strange Encounters: Paranoia and British Science Fiction Cinema



Outline: Robert Shail will explain how Science Fiction, whether in literature or cinema, has often been used as a vehicle to express contemporary anxieties. Alien encounters, rogue technology and dystopian futures are often projections of real fears about our current predicaments. For example, in the 1950s and 1960s a cycle of American science fiction films, including Invasion of the Body Snatchers (1956) and Them! (1954), gave voice to Cold War anxieties and the threat of nuclear catastrophe. This talk however, will focus on the more neglected British science fiction cinema of the same period. Key films include the John Wyndham adaptations Village of the Damned (1960) and The Day of the Triffids (1962).

Biog: Robert Shail has led research development in the School of Film, Music and Performing Arts at Leeds Beckett University since 2015. He also teaches film history in the Northern Film School. He has published widely in these areas. His study of the Children's Film Foundation, which was supported by a Leverhulme Fellowship, has been published by Palgrave-Macmillan/BFI in 2015.
